Introduction

This inventory of Potential Funding Sources is one of several recommendations that resulted from the Route 3, West Chester Pike, Land Use and Access Management Strategies Study, completed by DVPRC during fiscal years 2005 and 2006. This study was initiated by Delaware County, with support from the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PENNDOT), through the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC) Annual Planning Work Program. The Route 3 Corridor for this study extends nearly seven miles from I-476 to the Chester County line in Delaware County. A segment of Route 252, bounded by Goshen Road to the North and Upper Providence Township to the South, is also included in the study area.

Phase I of this report was conducted by DVRPC, with support from the Delaware County Planning Department, the Delaware County TMA, PENNDOT District 6-0, SEPTA, and the three study area municipalities. As part of Phase I, municipal plans and zoning ordinances were reviewed, goals and objectives identified, existing conditions described, and recommendations prepared for the three study area municipalities. During fiscal years 2006 and 2007, DVRPC will enter Phase II of this project, which entails the development and completion of the planning tasks specified by the Study Advisory Committee. The potential implementation activities for Phase II include:

- o Corridor Access Management Analysis for secondary areas
- o Access Management Model Ordinances
- o Amendments to Comprehensive Plans
- o Special Historic Preservation and / or Mixed Use Zoning Overlay Districts
- o Inventory of Funding Sources for Planning Activities
- o Exploring modified SEPTA bus routes to serve growing residential areas
- o Official Map Model Ordinances

The following inventory of Potential Funding Sources briefly outlines funding programs for which the study area municipalities are eligible. These programs are primarily administered by various federal, state, and county government agencies; however, some programs are managed by DVRPC or other non-profit organizations. Each entry into the spreadsheet includes the funding program name as well as a brief description of the program. In most cases, this description outlines the eligible applicants for the program, the purpose of the program, and examples of both eligible and non-eligible projects. The spreadsheet also details any specific terms involved in the acceptance of the grants or loans, upcoming funding application deadlines, and contact information for the pertinent program administrator. Where available, website addresses are given for applicants to gain detailed information on the program and application process.

To make this funding inventory more useful for the study area municipalities, a matrix was created to link the funding sources with implementation activities recommended in the Phase I report. The matrix (see Figure 1) follows the format of the Phase I report by presenting the recommendations under the broader categories of Growth Management, Circulation, and Community Character. The name of each funding program detailed in the funding inventory is listed across the X-axis of the matrix, while the recommendations are listed along the y-axis. For each recommendation, an "X" is placed under the funding program(s) that may be utilized to help complete that implementation activity. The result is a useful table that clearly illustrates which programs can be used to fund the various implementation activities described in the Phase I report. While the programs listed are not meant to be all-inclusive, this inventory of funding sources provides a concise resource for the study area municipalities to transform study recommendations into improvements that will benefit their community.

The following chart lists program and funding sources through the federal, state and county governments that may be applicable for projects within the study area. The chart is not meant to be all-inclusive, as other programs and funding sources may be available.

To the best of DVRPC's knowledge, the information provided is the most up-to-date at the time of publication. Please contact the specific agency for program and procedural specifics. It is recommended that you also speak with the contact for eligibility verification for your specific project and matching fund requirements before proceeding with the application process.
