Potential Funding Sources for Mitigation Action

A fundamental part of hazard mitigation planning is to identify sources for funding to implement projects and spur action. There are many sources for potential funding of mitigation actions. Some, like the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) mitigation grants, are commonly known, while others are not widely considered for mitigation action. The tables below identify potential funding sources, with information about each grant program. This is not a comprehensive list; communities are encouraged to seek out additional funding sources that may be related to a particular mitigation action. Just as communities should take a holistic approach to hazard mitigation planning, they should also holistically seek synergies between mitigation, planning, and funding sources. Communities are encouraged to coordinate with their county Planning Department, county Office of Emergency Management, State Hazard Mitigation Officer, Floodplain Manager, and Silver Jackets to identify additional funding sources relevant to the identified project.

FEMA Hazard Mitigation Assistance

There are three types of FEMA Hazard Mitigation Assistance: Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP), Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM), and Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA). In order to be eligible for these grants, applicant communities *must* have a FEMA approved and adopted hazard mitigation plan. This requirement can be satisfied either by developing and adopting an individual municipality plan, or by participating in the planning process and adopting the county plan. Additionally, the proposed project *must* be identified as a mitigation action in the hazard mitigation plan.
